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Who Needs a Flu Vaccine and When | CDC

Routine annual influenza vaccination is recommended for all persons aged ≥ 6 months who do not have contraindications. For each recipient, a licensed and age-appropriate vaccine should be used. Inactivated influenza vaccines (IIVs), recombinant influenza vaccine (RIV4), and live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV4) are expected to be available.

Recommendations for the Use of Influenza Vaccines, 2020-21

Administer 1 dose of seasonal influenza vaccine to persons: 6 months through 8 years of age who have received at least 2 doses of seasonal influenza vaccine (trivalent or quadrivalent) before July 1, 2016 9 years of age and older, regardless of their immunization history (persons 9 years of age and ...

An influenza (flu) shot is a flu vaccine given with a needle, usually in the arm. Seasonal flu shots protect against the three or four influenza viruses that research suggests may be most common during the

upcoming season. The composition of flu vaccines have been updated for the 2020-2021 flu season.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices today released its recommendations for the 2020-2021 flu season, which continue to advise yearly flu vaccination for all people aged 6 months and older. It expects this season's flu vaccines to include inactivated, recombinant and live attenuated vaccines, including two new vaccines expected to produce a better immune response in people aged 65 years and older.

Frequently Asked Influenza (Flu) Questions: 2020-2021 ...

The best way to protect against flu and its potentially serious complications is with a flu vaccine. CDC recommends that almost everyone 6 months of age and older get a seasonal flu vaccine each year by the end of October. However, as long as flu viruses are circulating, vaccination should continue throughout flu season, even into January or later.
